Department Overview

Kansas City, Kansas, sitting on the eastern edge of Kansas and bordering Missouri, is the third largest city in the state. It is separated from the larger Kansas City - Kansas City, Missouri by the confluence of the Kansas and Missouri Rivers and State Line Road. It is part of a consolidated city-county government known as the Unified Government of Wyandotte County and Kansas City, Kansas.



The Kansas City, Kansas Police Department works to ensure the safety the 153,000 residents of the community which spans approximately 125 square miles. In 2022 the Department moved from four (Midtown, East, West and South) operational patrol divisions to three when Midtown was absorbed into East and West patrols in order to maximize staffing.

A total of 369 sworn officers were assigned to those divisions as well as a variety of specialized units. The KCKPD is proud of its racially diverse sworn staff; the most diverse in the region.

Approximately 90 professional staff bring the total number of employees to 441. These skilled and dedicated employees provide administrative support as well as specialized skills in units including Records, Victim Services, Communications, Technology and Animal Services,

Patrol officer duties include responding to calls for service, both non-emergency and emergency, initial investigations, evidence collection, enforcing laws and crime prevention activities. The Community Support Division also operates within the Patrol Bureau. Focused on improving the quality of life for residents of Kansas City, Kan. through community engagement and the proactive and reactive enforcement of laws, it includes Community Policing, Traffic, Special Operations and the Police Athletic League. By fostering relationships and opening up the lines of communication, we hope to increase the community's trust level that will, in turn, encourage residents to work cooperatively with us to create safer neighborhoods where we all live, work and play.

These highly trained men and women strive to serve every community member they contact with fairness and respect.

SPECIAL OPERATIONS UNIT (SOU)

The KCKPD Special Operations Unit is comprised of two full-time sergeants; eight full-time officers; one part-time sergeant and eight part-time officers. They receive specialized training that enables them to respond to high-risk situations.



The following additions and upgrades were made to equipment used members of SOU:

BearCat - A new BearCat was purchased to replace an older model that was in use. A BearCat is an armored rescue vehicles which is used to transport SOU officers to and from hostile situations and to assist with the recovery and protection of civilians in harm's way. (Pictured at right.)



ICOR Robot - The addition of this robot gives officers the ability to remotely respond to high-risk situations with a variety of capabilities, including:

- Surveillance provides real-time video and audio to help officers observe and assess situations
- Communication enables two-way communication with suspects or victims
- Manipulation of objects like doors
- Detonation of objects remotely.
- Inspection of vehicles, trains, equipment, etc.
- Intelligence gathering of important information

X-Ray Machine - Purchased by the Mid American Regional Counsel, EOD received a new X-Ray machine as an upgrade to current technology.

OFFICER INVOLVED CRITICAL INCIDENTS

In 2023, KCKPD was involved in five separate incidents that involved the use of lethal force. Out of those incidents two subjects died from their injuries and four were treated for gunshot wounds. Additionally, three officers sustained gunshot wounds, two were treated for shrapnel and one for minor injuries.

These incidents were investigated by various outside agencies and KCKPD units including: KCKPD Major Case Detectives, KCKPD Internal Affairs Unit, KCKPD Crime Scene Investigation Unit (CSI), KCKPD Officer Involved Critical Incident Team, Investigators from the Wyandotte County Sheriff's Office, Detectives Shadowing from the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department Homicide Unit, and the Kansas Bureau of Investigation..

The Wyandotte County District Attorney's Office reviewed all incidents and determined the officers' actions were justified.

This year a memorandum was authored and signed by the KCKPD and the Kansas Bureau of Investigations granting full control of KCKPD Officer Involved Shooting (OIS) to their agency. Members of the KCKPD Major Case unit serve as liaison to KBI investigators. Once the investigation is complete, KBI will turn over their findings to the Wyandotte County District Attorney's Office for review and final disposition. The first investigation led by KBI occurred in December of 2023.



COMMUNITY POLICING UNIT

TRAFFIC UNIT

KCKPD's Traffic Support Unit (TSU) provides support for calls for service and community events; manages crash scenes; enforces seat belt compliance; speeding; towing of vehicles; DUI compliance; and participates in selective enforcement campaigns. The Unit is comprised of two sergeants , 7 patrol officers, and 1 officer specifically assigned to DUI enforcement.

CRISIS INTERVENTION TEAM

CIT officers & co-responders work with individuals in our city that are experiencing a mental health crisis or need assistance accessing mental health services.

In 2023 CIT implemented a second full time coresponder position. Along with this addition, a new training program was implemented for co-responder training. CIT now supports the City with staffing from 9 AM - 10 PM.

CIT hosted a 40-hour CIT training course and anticipates continuing to host a basic class in the Spring and offering an advanced class in the Fall of 2024. The team also attended the International CIT Conference in Detroit.

COMMUNITY-BASED INITIATIVES

Homeless Outreach - Officers continue to perform Weekly Outreach to the unhoused of the community and provide resources through partners such as Frank Williams, Crosslines Community Outreach, Catholic Charities, Helping Hands Center of Hope, WYCO Care Connect, 3 Oaks Hospice, and Housing Authority. This year they created and distributed over 600 brochures outlines services serving the homeless population; assisted in camp clean-ups; and promoting the KCKPD ID Program.

City ID Program - Community Policing continues to issue id cards to residents who have been unable to obtain a state-issued identification card due to the loss of necessary personal documents.

This year 367 City IDs were issued with a verification rate of 95.6%. Additionally 322 individuals were able to then obtain a state ID card.

The primary reason applications were denied were officers were unable to verify information that was provided by the applicants



Christmas Program - In 2023, the Community Policing Unit successfully raised over \$27,000 for the Christmas program, enabling them to support and adopt 58 families. These families included a total of 176 children who received Christmas gifts through the program.

Summer Cadet Program - The 2023 Summer Cadet Program provided employment for eight young adults from our community. Throughout this program, the Cadets explored various career paths within the UG and other organizations, including BSNF and volunteer opportunities.

National Child Safety Council Program (NCSC) - By collaborating with the NCSC, the department may now accept donations from local businesses. These contributions are used to purchase items for distribution at events, such as bracelets, pencils, and more. In 2023, the program successfully raised over \$8,500.

School Resource Officers (SROs)- In addition to the SRO's at Turner, Bishop Ward and Piper High Schools, an additional position was added for the Kansas School for the Blind, located at 1100 State Ave.

Across the country, Police Athletic Leagues work to foster strong relationships between police and the communities they serve through engagement with young people. Here in Kansas City, Kansas, the PAL, located at 5th & Elizabeth on historic Strawberry Hill, is one of the strongest in the nation.

PAL KCK is an initiative of the Kansas City, Kansas Police Department, and operates as a privately funded 501c3 organization. It is managed by an independent not-for-profit board and in addition to professional staff, three KCKPD Community Policing Officers work at the PAL full-time.

2023 Highlights

Garden and Art Program

The PAL garden manager works five to six days per week during the growing season and teaches cooking classes for PAL kids in the off season using the fresh produce they grow to prepare healthy meals. The PAL art instructor teaches three classes each week, providing our kids with a creative outlet. Our art program continues to be one of our best attended classes.

Driver's Education

More than 100 students successfully completed the PAL Kansas Driver's Education course, earning their Kansas learning permits and driver's licenses. Our police officer instructors also assisted them in navigating the licensure process, even taking them to the department of motor vehicles to complete their paperwork and testing. All of this is done at no cost to the youth; in lieu of payment, the students each perform 30 hours of documented community service. The program has received national attention as the only officer-instructed course of it's kind in the country.

The PAL also continues to provide support, space and equipment to other non-profits as a way of contributing further to our community at large. These include local groups from the Parkinson's Foundation, Golden Gloves and Special Olympics Kansas.



The KCKPD Criminal Investigations Bureau (CIB) is responsible for all investigations within the City of Kansas City, Kan. Their goal is to aggressively investigate crime in an effort to create an environment where all individuals feel safe to live, work and play.

The Bureau is comprised of 3 Divisions: Criminal Investigations Division (CID), Special Investigations Division (SID), and Animal Services Division (ASD). The Victim Services Unit and Police Chaplain Services are also operate within the Bureau. The commander is Lt. Col. Raymond Nuñez.

Cold Case Unit

Launched in January of 2022, the unit, comprised of a captain and three detectives. The Unit has implemented a Metro Area meeting that includes investigators, prosecutors and CSI technicians. This group meets quarterly and works together to help investigate and provide assistance to other agencies. and has established relationships that have aided our department with free DNA testing of multiple items.

VIOLENT CRIME TASK FORCE

These stats are for all of VCTF. The 346 arrests are for self-initiated cases and do not include arrests made by patrol on 48 hour holds. Narcotics filed 400 affidavits for case charging (self-initiated and 48 hour holds from patrol).

This was the activity by VCTF. The total number of search warrants include homes, vehicles, and cell phones. The majority of search warrant assists are from processing cell phones and computers for other agencies on their search warrants. We assisted 11 outside agencies with cell phone extractions.

KCKPD Response to Fentanyl Epidemic

KCKPD has implemented a three pronged approach of education, investigation, and enforcement to combat the nationwide fentanyl epidemic. In 2023 KCKPD seized: 382,178 fentanyl laced pills and 50 lbs. of powder fentanyl, which is equal to 8,893,960 lethal doses.

The unit continues to drive home messaging to the public, in particular, young people, about the dangers of fentanyl and the importance of immediate medical intervention (administering Narcan and calling 911) if faced with a fentanyl overdose. In 2023 the captain of the Narcotics Unit made 53 presentations to school and community groups. Additionally, thanks to a grant from the Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program, KCKPD produced a 60second educational PSA targeting teens that was promoted via social media and our partners.



ANIMAL SERVICES UNIT



Foster Program

To help address the overwhelming need to intake stray animals from our community, KCKAS established a foster program. When an animal goes to foster, it opens up a kennel in our shelter, allowing us to care for another pet in need. With support from the volunteerbased, Friends of Kansas City, Kansas Animal Services, it has also proven to get dogs adopted 50+% more quickly than residing in the shelter environment.



Veternary Care & Community Outreach

In 2023 a new partnership was formed with Pet Resource Center, Kansas State University Veterinary Medicine School, Mission Veterinary Emergency & Specialty and Great Plains SPCA to provide veterinary services at the shelter. This new partnership is anticipated to save the shelter a significant amount of money which will be directed towards a community-driven, free spay/neuter program that will directly impact KCK's animal overpopulation problem.

KCKAS also held its first Spay/Neuter Public Event for residents in 2023. A total of 24 dogs and 21 cats were spayed/neutered, vaccinated, microchipped, and licensed for free. Owners were brought into compliance with ordinances, effectively preventing thousands of unwanted pets from being born.

Administrative Support



The Services Bureau maintains the "infrastructure" of the department, providing vital services within the department. These include communications/emergency dispatch, records, staff support and technology services. The commander of the Services Bureau is Lt. Col. George Sims.

COMMUNICATIONS/DISPATCH

KCKPD Call Takers handle 911 including those for the Wyandotte County Sheriff's Office, Bonner Springs and Edwardsville Police Departments. For calls requiring fire and/or medical service are also answered and quickly connected to KCKFD dispatch.



RECORDS UNIT

Records Unit personnel staff the walk-in lobby window at KCKPD Headquarters and the walk-in report desks at South and East Patrol. They handle all security guard permit applications; enter, remove, and validate stolen property in the national NCIC database; and submit KCKPD case and arrest information to the State of Kansas KBI Incident Reporting System.

- Entered 46,000 incident, accident, arrest and case reports into our system
- Launched Desk Officer Reporting System (DORS) that allows the public to directly enter their own reports for minor offenses, resulting in 107 reports being entered
- Processed 3000 accident reports
- Issued 804 security guard permits

INFORMATION AND TECHNOLOGY

Information and Technology touches all parts of the department. The types of available IT resources and the extent to which we rely them for emergency services, operations, investigations and administration is increasing every year. The Unit services the broad spectrum of tech resources that enable all PD units to provide the most efficient and effective service possible.

- Provided technical training to sworn and professional staff
- Improvements made to report writing logic and forms
- Over 2,000 service requests were processed
- Managed operation of LPRs (License Plate Readers) and traffic camera and their transitioning to fiber optics
- Replaced all patrol computers and body cameras
- Maintained registry of over 4,000 alarm registrants and monitored false alarms
- Deployed CAD/Mobile system to Edwardsville Police Department

INTERNAL AFFAIRS

The mission of the Internal Affairs Unit is to protect the public, the employee, and the Department through fair, thorough, and impartial investigations of alleged misconduct. The KCKPD Internal Affairs Unit reviews and investigates complaints regarding its employees as well as employees of the Unified Government. The statistics shared in this report relate only to the Kansas City, Kansas Police Department.



To put the number of complaints into perspective, in 2023 there were 128,499 incidents (calls for service) involving Kansas City, Kansas Police Department (KCKPD) personnel. Using that figure comparing it to the total number of complaints (46 for KCK), there was one complaint made for every 2,793 incidents.



Over the past 10 years, the number of use of force incidents (one incident can involve multiple officers) has fluctuated between 182 and 266. Two use of force complaints were filed in 2023.

Other

The number of administrative complaints has remained fairly consistent over the past ten years due in part to the increased the use of administrative special investigations over the same time period. When allegations of possible misconduct are presented, the Chief of Police initiates an investigation to determine if officers are meeting the expectations of the Department. The trend line for the past four years has decreased with 2017 (31 administrative special complaints) being the highest in the ten-year period. There were no administrative complaints in 2023.



2023 Investigation Dispositions

There were 46 internal investigations performed by Internal Affairs in 2023. More than half, 29, of those investigations were based on complaints which originated from outside of the Department. Two of 46 investigations were reported as criminal in nature. One of the criminal cases was declined by the Wyandotte County District Attorney's Office.
